Security at KAS

I am Mirghani Idris KAS liaison officer at Khartoum American School, I have been working at KAS for 16 years. One of my main responsibilities at KAS along with others is ensuring that we have strict security measures in place. We ensure that our guards understand that our students safety is our top priority. Some of the main tasks of our guards is to ensure the following:

- · Overseeing the entrance and exit access in a safe orderly manner.
- · Ensuring that all vehicles allowed inside the campus have proper school ID stickers or are identified and cleared for entrance based on school business matters. If you have not collected you car sticker yet, please ask our guards to give you one as you are dropping your child.
- · Recording the names of visitors after they present a legal and current ID.
- · Overseeing the entrance to the pool area. Ensuring that ONLY KAS community families and staff families use the pool after 4 pm until 9 pm.
