Superintendent's Message

Khartoum American School - Board of Governors - 2018-19

The Khartoum American School, founded in 1957, is governed by a Board of ten members. KAS is closely associated with the United States Embassy in Khartoum and the U.S. Ambassador appoints one member to the Board. Eight members are elected by the parent body and the Superintendent serves as an ex-officio member.

KAS operates as a not-for-profit school. Regular Board meeting sessions are open to parents who notify the Superintendent one week prior to the meeting. Executive sessions are only for Board members.

The Board carries out its meetings democratically, using Robert's Rules as a guideline. The Board holds an Annual General Meeting every April or May where new Board members are elected. Board members serve two-year terms and are renewable -

At the AGM reports to parents on the status of the school are given along with a financial report. KAS carries out an annual audit. The Board aims for transparency, good communication and fair treatment to all in the community.

Studying Successfully



As the students have returned from EID break, the 2018-2019 school year is in full swing. Students are engaging in their classes and setting academic goals for themselves. To facilitate this KAS has created Study Halls for seniors who are taking more than one Advance Placement class to provide an opportunity for them to do independent work for those classes while at school, and I am fortunate to proctor one of those sessions daily.

For the Study Hall the students enter the classroom, find a space, and get right down to work, periodically asking to visit another teacher to further their understanding or clarify a question. Sometime they discuss concepts or guide each other in their studying. Today two of the seniors were preparing for an AP World History assessment on early civilizations and were discussing the people from Papua New Guinea. As a former history teacher, I joined their conversation briefly. Others were working on AP Calculus problems and assisting each other.



This opportunity for study at school, where instructors are available, is teaching the students both how to structure their time successfully as a student and encouraging them to seek guidance in their learning as necessary. Plus they see each other as scholars who motivate each other to succeed. The Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (ACSD) and independent research by Dicken, Foreman, Jensen, and Sherwood (2008)have shown positive results for student success using tutored study halls.
